I strongly believe that I am blessed to have inherited her curiosity, tenacity and courage. I wish to acknowledge the community building efforts of our previous generations of immigrants, on whose shoulders we stand tall today.

I want to draw your attention to the pressing issue that requires our urgent attention: domestic violence and the adverse impact of family conflict on children. These dark corners of our society cast long shadows and silently affect countless lives. But darkness can only prevail until we shine a light upon it. We, as a compassionate and inclusive nation, must ensure that no one lives in fear.
